

During the academic year 2017-18, the Campus Life Assessment Committee reviewed the co-curricular learning outcomes from the Student Affairs Co-Curricular Agenda (2008) for alignment with the current UULOs and their six more specific outcomes. This review resulted in some co-curricular learning outcomes shifting to align better with UULOs. When a current co-curricular learning outcome did not align with a specific outcome, "none" was reported.
